From the Property Committee: The building repair &

maintenance work continues with J. Fiske, Sr., LLC. The boiler inspections were completed in early April and the required work on the hot water boiler has been completed. The steam boiler has developed a leak in one or more of the cast iron coils. Due to the boiler's age and high cost of replacement parts, the process has begun to replace it. Water samples from the drinking fountain have been tested and passed the PA DEP's standards - the fountain is reopened for use. A men's room steam heat source is expected to be replaced with electric heat. As summer winds down, parking lot repairs, along with the fall lawn treatment and landscape maintenance are planned.






for Youth in Grades 8 and Higher Information Meeting – Sunday October 1st First Confirmation Meeting – Sunday, October 22nd

Marmee by Sarah Miller



2023 Women's Connection Weekend at Montreat "Seen"

In August, women from our church traveled to Montreat, NC for the Women's Connection Weekend. We were led through an amazing Bible study on Hagar by Rev. Dr. Margaret Aymer, the Academic Dean and a Biblical professor at Austin (Presbyterian) Theological Seminary, and enjoyed insightful sermons by Rev. Ellen Crawford True, pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Concord, NC. There were wonderful workshops, including hiking, Montreat history, the spiritual practice of writing, hymns, spirituality and the enneagram, and practicing hospitality and welcome in the church. It was a wonderful time and space for renewal. The biggest highlight by far was the opportunity to hear Kate Bowler in person. A Blessing For Your Beloved, Ordinary Self

If I try very hard (or barely at all) today I might not think of you at all. Except, if you don't mind, let me notice you. Show up in the small necessities and everyday graces.
